SUCCESSFULLY WORKING WITH CHILDREN WITH CHALLENGING BEHAVIORS

Are these children spoiled? manipulative? stubborn? obstinate? pushy?

The problem with these labels is that they imply that the children's behaviors are contemplated and intentional. We quickly find that usual reward-and-punishment strategies do not work with these children. Working with these kids often makes people feel frustrated, overwhelmed, guilt-ridden, and exhausted. Sometimes we reach the point where we feel the situation is hopeless. So what do we do? This session looks closely at these children and works to develop systems that help them, support you, assist their classmates, and empower their parents. **Free, Monday, 2/8, 6-8pm @ LFC. DANCE TO LEARN

We will teach two sample classes. The workshop attendees will actively learn during the classes and participate as if they were the children in the class. We will also provide you with ideas on how to incorporate more music, movement and storytelling into your programs. Our curriculum helps young children learn the sixteen Elements of Dance (Place, Size, Level, Direction, Pathway, Focus, Speed, Rhythm, Energy, Weight, Flow, Body Parts, Relationships, Shapes, Balance and Emotion) along with important locomotor and nonlocomotor movement skills. The BrainDance is based on fundamental movement patterns that help to wire the central nervous system. The BrainDance helps students and teachers become more focused, energized, and ready to learn. The Elements of Dance and the BrainDance help children to develop a full kinesphere of movement while providing a creative, fun and engaging kinesthetic lesson which reinforces concepts of early literacy, social studies, math, and science. The curriculum helps build cognitive, physical, social, and emotional skills.

HOW TO CREATE CHANGE IN YOUR COMMUNITY AND HOW TO CREATE CHANGE THROUGH ADVOCACY

Participants in this training will have improved grassroots organizing skills and the confidence and ability to leverage their personal networks (as well as those in their community) to make change for Vermont's children.

Participants will learn how to: Identify members of their community who have the skills, knowledge, interest or resources to be a part of your supporter network, understand and apply the principles of community engagement and grassroots organizing, and create a personal action plan

This training also provides an overview of policy advocacy, the power of our collective action and how you can make a difference. Participants will join a statewide network of highly skilled, confident and motivated advocates who will mobilize together to make policy change to ensure that every Vermont child has access to high-quality, affordable child care. Participants will learn how to: understand the basics of policy advocacy and identify opportunities for greatest impact, articulate an understanding of why advocacy is essential to achieving high-quality, affordable child care, explain what the Blue Ribbon Commission is and how we can contribute to the Commission's work and develop an individual advocacy plan to advocate for policies that create positive change for Vermont's youngest children

CREATING PLEASANT MEALTIME ENVIRONMENTS IN CHILD CARE

Creating pleasant mealtime environments in child care influences children's belief and attitudes about food and can impact their nutritional choices throughout life. Family style meals promote the development of social, emotional, and gross and fine motor skills. In this workshop providers will learn about the benefits of creating a pleasant mealtime environment and define what a positive mealtime environment feels like. Providers will learn about and share practical tips for creating a successful mealtime environment in their program. Providers will have opportunities to discuss challenges and concerns around implementing family style meals and problem solve ways to overcome barriers.

BASIC SPECIALIZED SERVICES

This training is an introduction for early childhood providers who plan to care for children and families who require additional support (as identified by the State of Vermont). This training is required for all programs wishing to attain the "Basic Specialized Child Care Provider" status. Basic Specialized Services training is essential for serving children who have experienced abuse or neglect. Topics covered include: typical child development, the impact of stress and abuse on development, red flags, working with families and the system, as well as mandated reporting responsibilities. Working with children with special needs is also touched upon. This is a 6 hour training.
